Title	Principal subject individual class
Description	Private instruction in the principal instrument. Of key importance here is developing students' musical potential to the greatest extent possible, the A-MACK principles still serving as a guideline for achieving the highest degree of instrumental expression. In the last two years, private coaching is extended from 45 minutes in the third year to an hour in the fourth year. In the third year, students are expected to have developed into versatile pop musicians who can work in various professional contexts and situations. In the fourth year, they can then devote their principal private lessons to refining their bands and projects, a selection of which they can present on the final examination and their EP assignment. It is also possible that the principal instrument will play more of a minor role in the final presentation.

Description	<p>In the last two years of their studies, students are required to participate in three Advanced Style Labs and present them live. Because the units last half a year in this phase, students are expected to be able to present forty minutes of material for each Advanced Style Lab.</p> <p>Each student chooses a certain genre and focuses on the following study objectives:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Writing his or her own material within a given context Study of style in relation to the development of his or her personal taste Dealing with, and knowledge of, style material Crossover potential in relation to environment and history Integrating idioms autonomously A-MACK as a tool for further development <p>The aim is to choose three styles and analyse them thoroughly, incorporating them in the student's own material. Students may choose from the following genres accompanied by a band coach: acoustic, alternative, electronics, groove, metal, contemporary rock, symphony, far rock and ultimate pop. Introducing a sub-genre is allowed, provided there is good reason to do so. An example is ASL Afrika, a style ensemble which explored in depth contemporary popular music in Africa, resulting in a superbly balanced repertoire. Please note that such initiatives are looked on favourably, but keep in mind that students can also be added to your concept.</p> <p>Study objectives: 1. the student writing his or her own material within a given context; 2. study of style in relation to the development of his or her personal taste; 3. dealing with, and knowledge of, style material; 4. crossover potential in relation to environment and history; 5. being able to integrate idioms autonomously 6.
